The major roles provided by the advisory board are:

1. Provide advice on skills, knowledge, and attitudes required for specific occupations.
2. To assist in keeping programs current.
3. Inform the community of services provided by the college in occupational training.
4. To actively assist in the placement of graduates.

The board members are also carefully selected in order to get a good cross-section of the criminal justice system.

Included in the Los Angeles Mission College AJ Advisory Board are members from the

Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Secret Service, California Highway Patrol, Culver City Police Department, Los Angeles County Probation Department, Los Angeles Police Department and Monroe High School. Two of the board members are Mission College graduates.

The board met for the first time on November 30, 2007 and plans to meet again in the Spring to make further recommendations to improve the Administration of Justice program.

The Administration of Justice program is happy to announce the formation of an AJ Advisory board.

The purpose for an advisory board is to establish industrial and community partnerships with the college administration and vocational program.

New articulation agreements with Cal State L.A.

The Administration of Justice program at Mission College is now fully articulated to the Criminal Justice program at Cal State L.A.

All of the lower division course requirements for the B.S. degree in criminal justice at Cal State L.A. can now be taken here at Mission.

The AJ courses that articulate and transfer are AJ1, AJ2, AJ75, AJ160 (Police Management and Organization) and AJ4. These are the equivalent to Crim101, Crim126, Crim201, Crim202 and Crim203 at Cal State L.A.

For students, this is a savings

in time and money. For example, if a student were to take just one of these courses at Cal State, the tuition fee would be \$673.75 compared to \$60 at Mission.

Most of these courses will be offered every semester here at Mission in order to prepare students to transfer.

Starting in the spring of 2008, Professor Frank LaFlamme will be returning to Mission College and teaching again.

Professor LaFlamme has taught at Mission in the past and took a much needed break due to his other job commitments. He is a 23 year veteran of law enforcement starting with the Culver City Police department and later the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

Over his career his assignments have included patrol, narcotics, custody, special enforcement and detectives. He was also put in charge of training for other officers in the department.

Professor LaFlamme also brings to the program an extensive higher education background. He earned his undergraduate degree from USC in Political Science and later his Master's from Chapman University in Criminal

Justice.
